**Detail:** James was shot dead by a sniper as he tried to

rally his company during a massive German counter attack at the Battle of Cambrai in November 1917. The British had made huge advances on the 20th when they launched a surprise attack against the Hindenburg Line



using tanks, but the enemy struck back ten days later and James was killed.

Age at death: Military info:

College, Oxford, and planning a career in the Indian Civil Service. Life was mapped out for him - but the war changed everything. Fired by patriotism, James dropped his studies and applied for a commission. On 12th September 1914 he became a 2nd-Lt in the 7th DCLI, part of 61st Brigade, 20th (Light)

When war broke out James was in his third year reading classics at Worcester

Division. They landed in France on 25th July 1915. The Battalion played a minor part in the Battle of Loos in September and spent the winter around Ypres, where James wrote a war poem that was later published. They arrived on the Somme on 25th July 1916. James was now a captain. The Battalion

saw action on 22nd August at Guillemont and on the 29th they took over trenches surrounded by decaying bodies at Trones Wood. On 16th September they attacked Lesboeufs, taking the German first line at great cost. In October James became commander of A Company. The 7th DCLI took no part in the Battle of Arras, but were involved in a follow-up action on the Hindenburg

Line in May and June. James was now a major. In August the Dukes fought in the Third Battle of Ypres, at Langemarck, Menin Road Ridge and Polygon Wood. On 20th November they fought at Cambrai when troops with 475 tanks breached the Hindenburg Line. The British failed to exploit the gains and

on the 30th an enemy counter-attack overran the 7th DCLI and James was killed.

**Grave/memorial:** James Rae's body was never found. He is commemorated on the Cambrai

Memorial, at St Petroc's Church, Padstow and on Padstow War Memorial.

<u>Father:</u> James Edmond Rae, born Birkenhead, Cheshire in 1862. Banker.

Mother: Constance Eileen (maiden name unknown), born Cape Colony, South Africa in 1868. The couple married in Cape Colony in 1881 and had

5 children, one whom died. The family returned to UK and lived at Padstow.
